RHYME THESE!

Love, I am, fix, patching, repair, remarkable, rare.

ACTIVITY

- 1. Play the song "Love Me For Who I Am." Print lyrics and sing along.
- 2. Read Lyrics and highlight key words.
- 3. Ask each child what is special about them and write it on a paper heart.
- 4. Have each student hold his or her heart in front of the class; encourage students to cheer for what makes that child unique.
- 5. Stick the hearts to a bulletin board; encourage others to compliment the students on their unique gifts.
- 6. Film the kids holding their hearts, saying what makes them special. A great beginning of the year "break the ice" project; show on parent's night.

EXTENSION

- 1. CLASSROOM/PHYSICAL EXPERIENCE Students take turns telling a peer what they like about them. They can write these on strips of paper; each student gets a stapled mini book of strips expressing what classmates like about him or her.
- 2. HOME CONNECTION Family members are encouraged to share what they treasure in their child and send it into school to share at circle time.
- 3. COMMUNITY CONNECTION Organize a talent show to showcase what's special about each student and invite community members.
- 4. GLOBAL CONNECTION: Explore children in history who have used their diversity to make a difference (e.g., Malala, Anne Frank, others)
- 5. CREATIVE CONNECTION Write, draw or sing your own story, poem, picture or song. Use song lyrics as examples to encourage students to explore metaphors, i.e. "I'm a precious stone... remarkable and rare."
